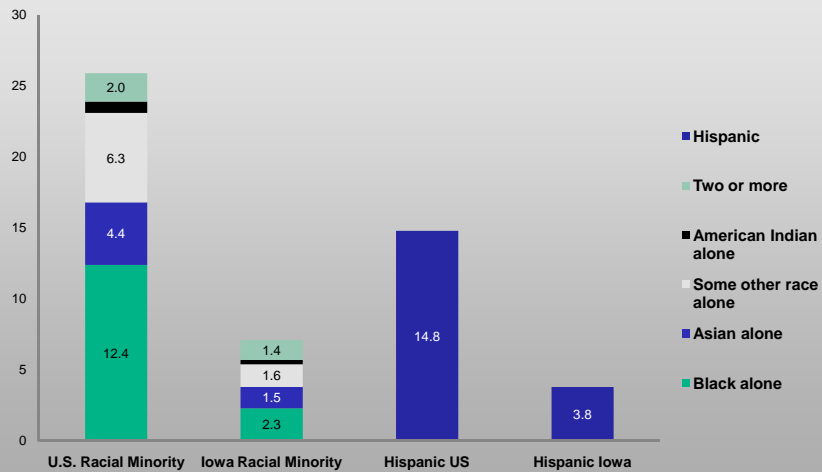
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Who is the Population of Scrutiny

- We are concerned in Iowa with any specific racial or ethnic group that is considered, colloquially, as a "minority."
- Blacks, Asians, American Indian, Hispanics (of any race), Pacific Islanders, and others

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Distributions in 2006



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Dispersions

- Iowa is divided into census tracts for accounting purposes
 - Metropolitan tracts average about 3,970 persons
 - Nonmetropolitan tracts average about 3,690 persons

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Minority Concentrations

- ✓ 80 percent of the state's Black residents lived within a set of just 166 census tracts that accounted for only 25 percent of the state's entire population
- ✓ A set of 208 census tracts accounted for 80 percent of the Asian population and 35 percent of the state's total population
- ✓ A set of 275 census tracts accounted for 80 percent of the Hispanic population and 41 percent of Iowa's total population

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Spatial Distributions

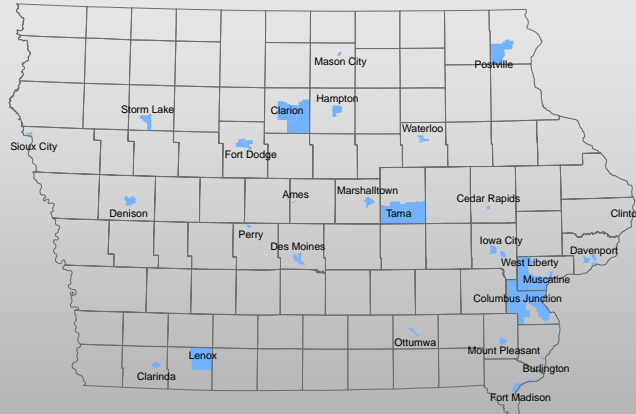
We are very interested in defining “diverse” communities or neighborhoods.

Defining “diverse” neighborhoods (census tracts)

- For metropolitan neighborhoods, > 20 percent minority = diverse
- For nonmetropolitan areas, > 9 percent = diverse

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PUMS Summaries

Analyzed 2006 Public Use Micro Data (PUMS) so that we could study minority population specifically and in the kind of detail that we desired.

Out of a sample of 16,366 just 856 fit our minority definitions

Cautious about our analysis

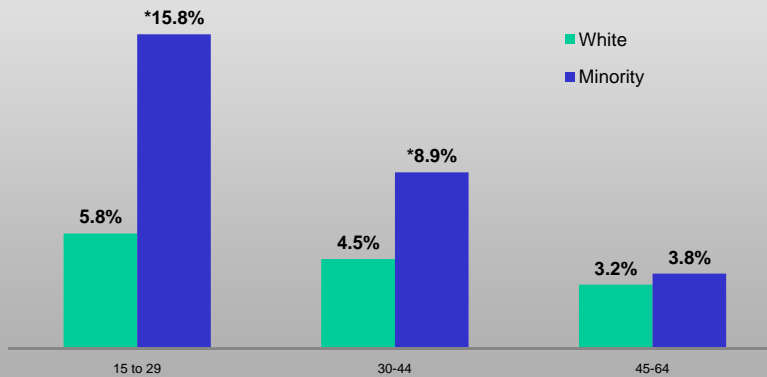

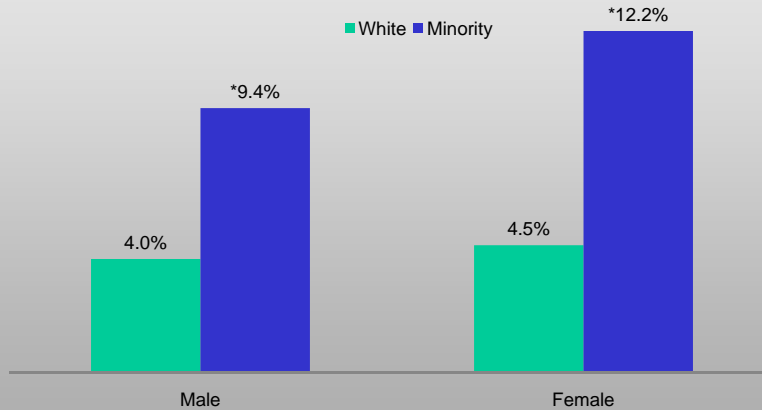
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Unemployment by Age: 2006



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Unemployment by Gender: 2006



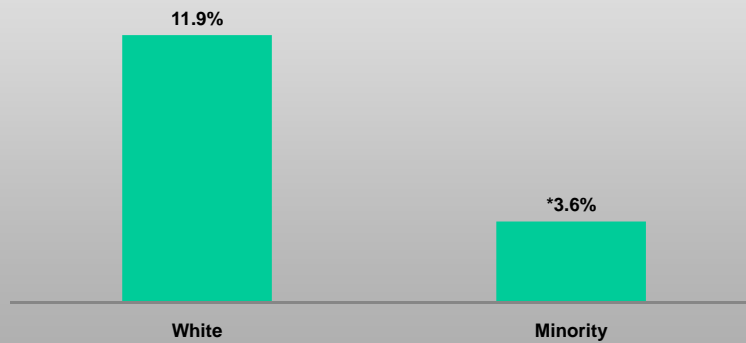

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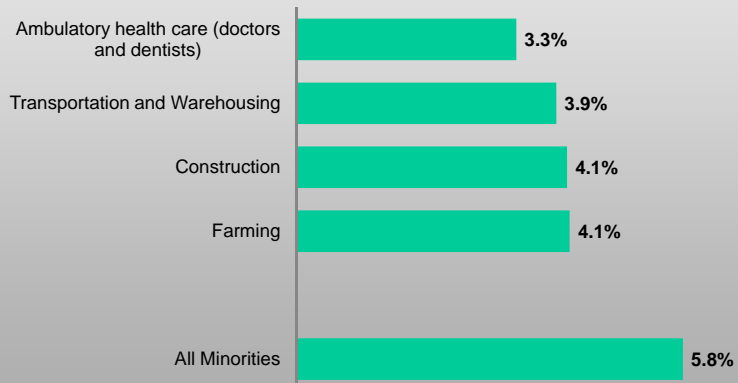

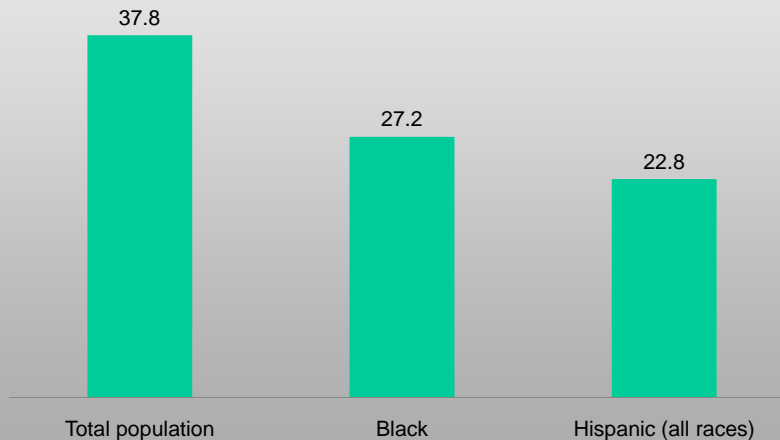
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Additional Minority Attributes

- A look at some impediments / concerns

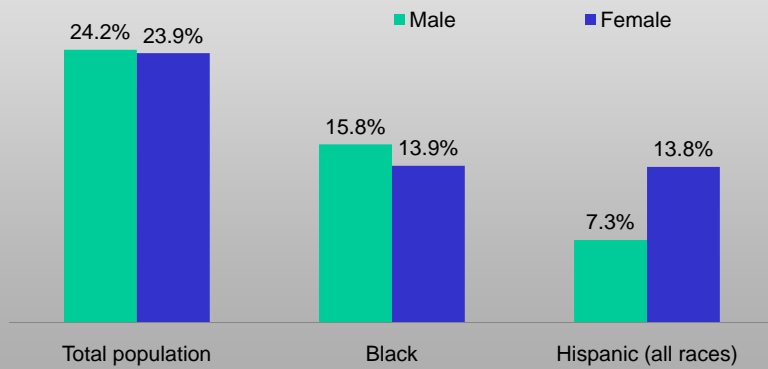
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Blacks and Hispanics: Median Age



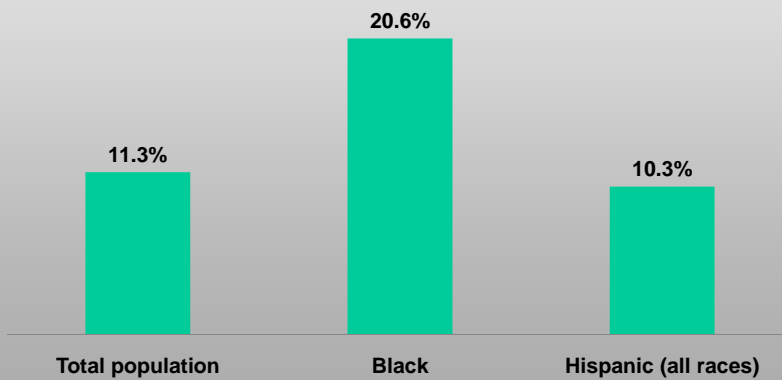
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Black and Hispanic: Bachelor's Degrees



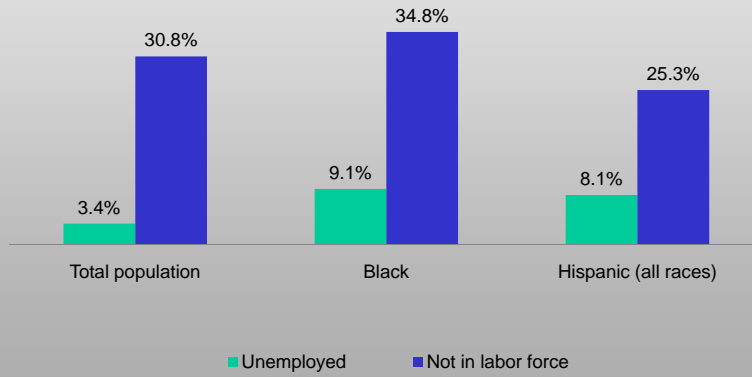
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Black and Hispanic: Disability Rates Persons 16 to 64



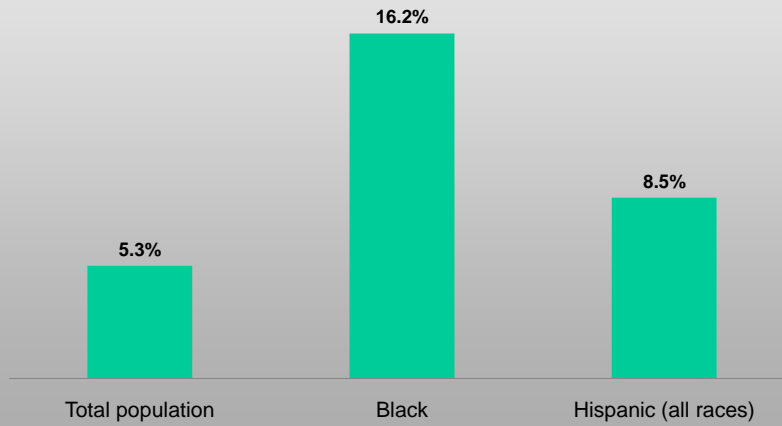
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Black and Hispanic: Unemployment Rates and Labor Force Non-Participation Rates in 2006

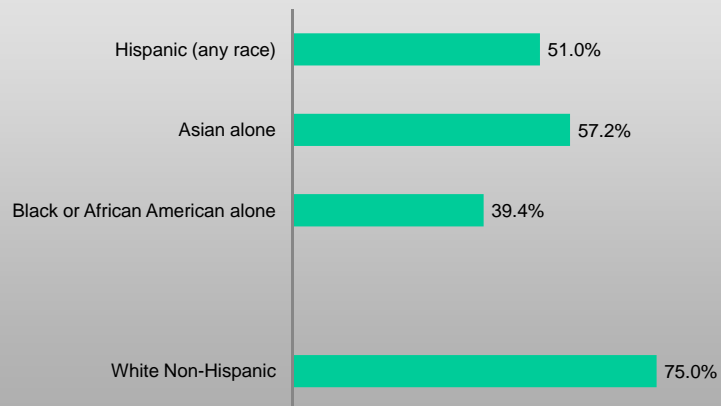

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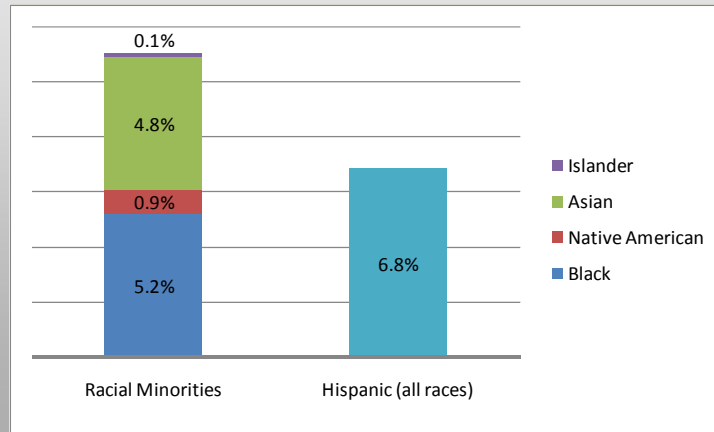
Minorities in Business

Allow us, however, to get a sense of minority business activity in Iowa and compare it to the nation.

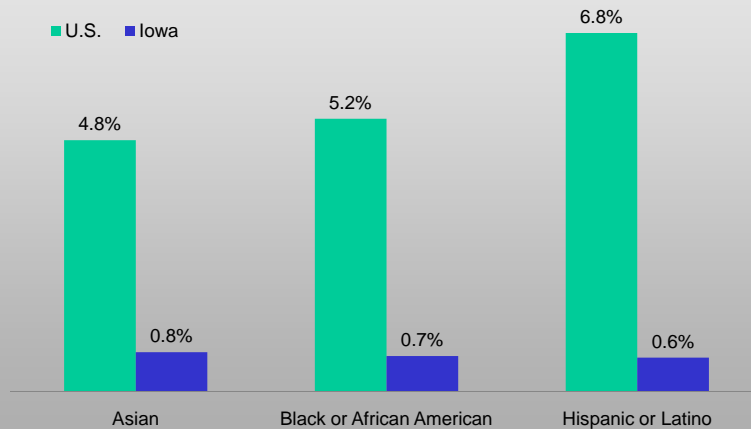
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National Minority Business Ownership in 2002



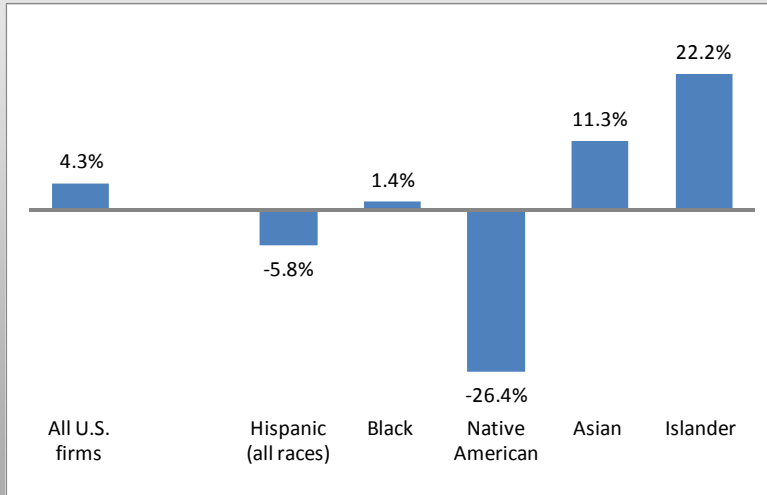
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Comparing Iowa with the U.S.



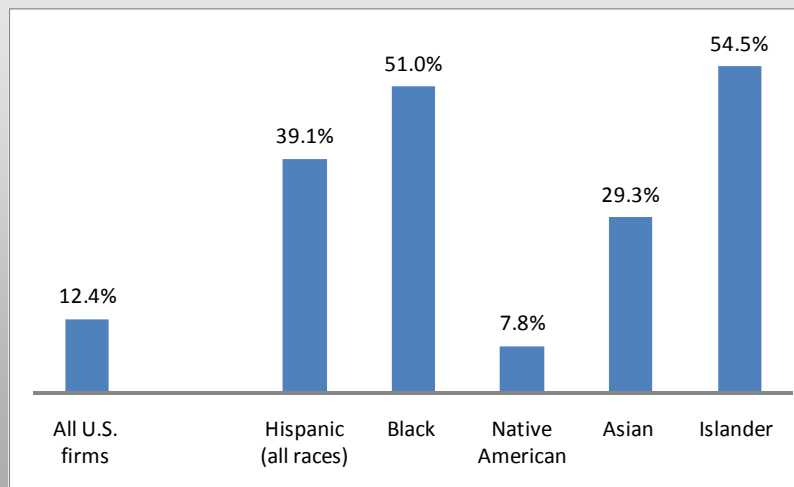
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Change in U.S. Business Firms, 1997 to 2002

- ✓ Is overall business investment (not just minority) significantly different in diverse areas?

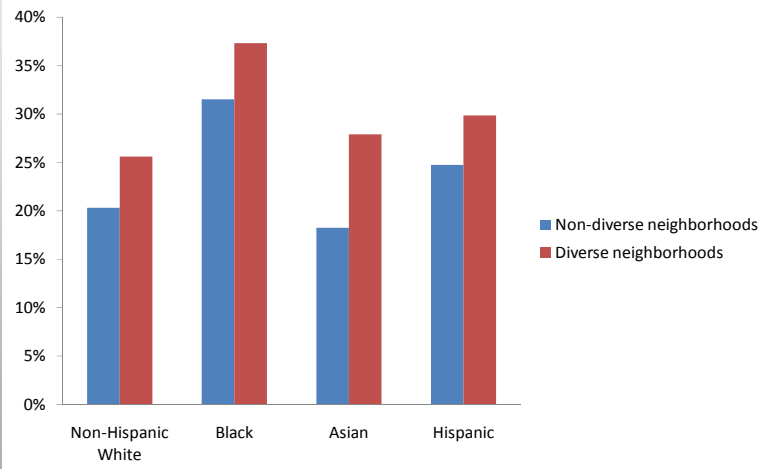
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Loan Activity in Diverse Areas of Iowa, 2006

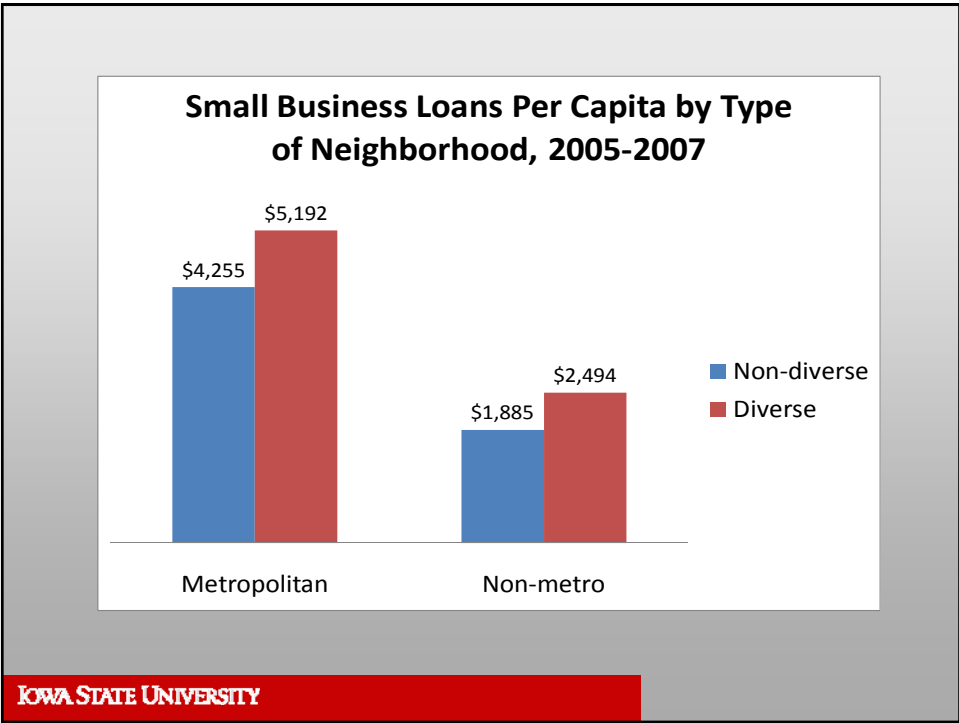
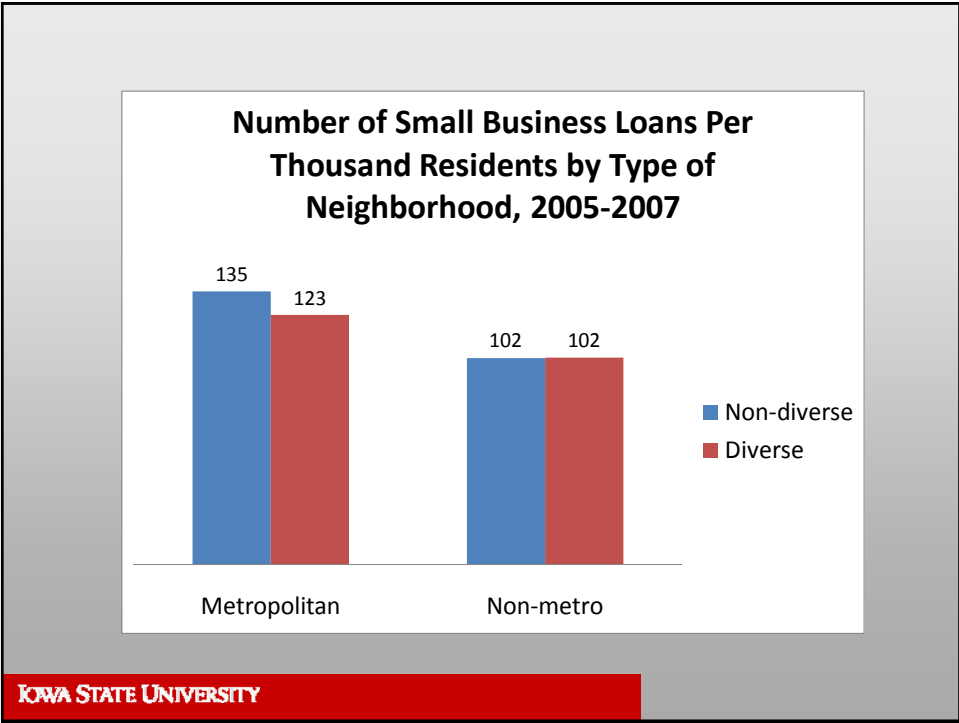
